9. MUNICIPAL PARK AND SPORTS COMPLEX IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT CONTRACT: THE CITY COUNCIL WILL CONSIDER A CONTRACT WITH HELLAS CONSTRUCTION, INC. FOR A GUARANTEED MAXIMUM PRICE OF \$16,567,446.25 FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF IMPROVEMENTS TO THE MUNICIPAL (13-ACRE) PARK AND THE SPORTS (SOFTBALL) COMPLEX AS AUTHORIZED BY VOTERS DURING THE BOND 2016 ELECTION — CITY MANAGER

City Manager, Randy Wright, presented the following information:

- ✓ Background Information and Project Priorities (City Manager)
- ✓ Municipal Park and Sports Complex Improvements (Hellas Construction, Inc.)
- ✓ Contract, Construction Sequencing, and Project Budget (Assistant City Manager)
- ✓ Financing Plan (Finance Director and Consulting Financial Advisor)

In May 2016, City voters approved a general obligation bond in the amount of \$25,200,000 for improvements to the Community Center, Municipal (13-Acre) Park, and Sports (Softball) Complex.

The estimated cost for the Municipal Park and Sports Complex Project is \$17,900,000 which includes the \$3,500,000 in existing bond proceeds. In July, staff met and heard presentations from three potential contractors which were competing for the Design Build Contract. It was clear that Hellas was the group for the project. In August 2016, the City Council authorized the City Manager to begin contract negotiations with Hellas Construction, Inc. Staff has met with Hellas, as well as AG-CM the construction managers to ensure the project is within budget and results in the very best product. Staff has also consulted with the sports leagues to make sure the projects being designed meet their individual needs.

Hellas was given was given three project priorities to guide them in their design:

#### **PROJECT PRIORITIES**

- Our kids come first. Design facilities that create the very best experience possible for our kids
- Create destinations with amenities that all our citizens can enjoy and benefit from vear round
- 3. Build for maximum versatility to permit both local league play and tournament opportunities

Mr. Wright recognized the Bond 2016 Advisory Committee members that were present (David Lewis and Judy Rodrigue).

Mr. Wright then introduced Reed Seaton, President/CEO of Hellas Construction.

Mr. Seaton introduced Mario Albini, VP Design Build Operations, Tianna Flores, VP Design; Taylor Medlin, Project Manager; and Brian Parks, Business Development Manager.

Hellas Representatives, Reed Seaton, Tiana Flores and Mario Albini gave a presentation that included the following key elements of the proposed scope of the project:

- Schematic layouts
- Design elements
- Budgets Schedules for the proposed

The City Council, City Manager, Assistant City Manager and Hellas Representatives discussed the following:

- LED Lighting
- Trees and shade structures
- Splash pad depth
- Fencing
- Decomposed granite and drainage
- Expanding the size of ball fields

Assistant City Manager, Brian DeLatte, presented the following information:

#### **Design and Construction Highlights**

- Coordination with leagues still required on final design elements
  - Concession building layouts
  - Colors, textures, finishes, and capital equipment
- Both complexes will be closed for the duration of construction
- Temporary fields will be constructed at Chatwork Park, Simpson Park, and G-PISD property so that no league play will be lost
- Will also utilize G-PISD baseball and softball fields.

#### **Proposed Contract and Construction Phase**

- AIA A141 Design-Build Contract
  - Guaranteed Maximum Price of \$16,567,446.25
  - Notice to Proceed on December 21, 2016
  - Substantial Completion by September 15, 2017
- AGCM will provide construction administration services
- Turf installed with 8-year manufacturer and 3<sup>rd</sup> party insured warranty
  - Hellas to provide infill inspection and grooming after first year

Director of Finance, Katie Griffin, explained that in May 2016 voters approved a general obligation bond in the amount of \$25,200,000 for improvements to the Community Center, Municipal (13 Acre) Park, and Sports (Softball) Complex. In August 2016, the City Council authorized the City Manager to begin contract negotiations with Hellas Construction for the improvements to Sports Complex and Municipal Park. The City's consulting financial advisor, Victor Quiroga will present the financing plan for the project, which includes the \$3,500,000 Certificate of Obligation bond to be used in February 2017.

The City's Financial Advisor, Victor Quiroga, with Frost Bank, presented the following information:

## Financing Plan for the Issuance of \$14,000,000 General Obligation Bonds, Series 2017

#### **2016 Bond Program – Background and Goals**

Successful bond election held on May 7, 2016 for \$25,200,000.

- Bond proceeds from the first bond sale will be used for the construction of a Sports Complex and Municipal Park improvements.
- \$25,200,000 bond authorization will be sold in three installments over three years to mitigate and layer the tax impact.
- Based on current construction and drawdown schedules, \$14,000,000 will be sold in February 2017.
- The year-over-year I&S tax impact from the Series 2017 bonds will be approximately 2.5¢ to 3.5¢ in the FYE 2018.

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The second reading of Ordinance No. 2146 remains unchanged from the first reading on December 20, 2016.

Ordinance No. 2146 proposes several text revisions to the Unified Development Ordinance (UDO). The revisions are necessary to address current development trends and to add clarity to conflicting ordinances. The Planning and Zoning Commission recommended adoption of the proposed amendments.

#### **PRIOR ACTIONS OR REVIEWS**

• December 20, 2016—The City Council conducted a public hearing and approved the first reading of Ordinance No. 2146.

#### **STAFF ANALYSIS**

The proposed revisions to the UDO are required to address current development trends and clarify conflicting ordinances:

- Revision of Section 317 for the reduction in the maintenance bond value required for subdivision construction.
- Revision of the Permitted Use Table to require Special Use Permits for hotels and allow telecommunications towers in the R-2 zoning district by Special Use Permit.
- Revision of Street Standards to require that cul-de-sacs be constructed of concrete.
- Revision of sanitary sewer construction specifications to require that new lines are inspected utilizing video rather than just mandrel testing.
- Revision of street lighting specifications to require LED street lights.

**SECTION 3**: Subsection J. Section 607. Street Standards., Chapter 6, Appendix A of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

J. Surface Improvements. After utilities have been installed, the developer shall construct curbs and gutters and shall surface roadways to the widths prescribed in these regulations. All road pavement, shoulders, drainage improvements and structures, curbs, turnarounds, and sidewalks shall conform to the city construction standards and specifications (which are contained in a separate ordinance), and shall be incorporated into the construction plans to be submitted for plat approval. A geotechnical report with pavement recommendations is required for the construction of road pavement. A boring plan shall be designed by a Professional Engineer licensed by the State of Texas for approval by the Administrative Official. All cul-de-sacs and all streets with residential lot frontage with horizontal curvature exceeding forty-five (45) degrees shall be concrete with a pavement section designed utilizing the geotechnical report's pavement recommendations.

**SECTION 4**: Subsection E. Section 616. Sanitary Sewer Facilities., Chapter 6, Appendix A of the Code of Ordinances is hereby created:

E. Sanitary Sewer Line Inspections. All sanitary sewer lines and manholes shall be cleaned, tested, and inspected prior to project acceptance. The Administrative Official shall determine whether CCTV (video) testing, air testing, mandrel testing, and/or vacuum testing shall be utilized. Specifications for the testing methods shall be determined by the Administrative Official.

**SECTION 5**: Section 618. Street Light Standards., Chapter 6, Appendix A of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

#### Sec. 618. - Street Light Standards.

The subdivision developer shall install street lights at locations approved by the City, including, but not limited to the following:

A. Intersections.

B. Approved interior block locations so the distance between street lights is five hundred (500) feet or less.

C. Curves where the delta angle is greater than 45 degrees or the centerline radius is less than one thousand (1,000) feet.

D. End of cul-de-sacs in excess of two hundred fifty (250) feet in length.

E. Dead ends when they are located more than two hundred fifty (250) feet from the nearest street light.

Lighting poles shall be constructed of aluminum or City-approved equivalent. Lighting fixtures shall be light-emitting diode (LED) in a wattage approved by the Administrative Official. In the interest of public safety, street lighting shall be located at and/or directly across street right-of-way from fire hydrants (the City may, at its discretion, waive certain location requirements where a conflict in distance within these parameters occurs). The developer shall complete installation of said street lighting prior to acceptance of the subdivision improvements by the City. The developer shall pay for any additional cost, if any, above the credit allowance that the City receives from the utility company. The City will energize and pay all monthly charges, after power is available to the system and the City deems it appropriate.

**SECTION 6:** If any provision, section, clause or phrase of this Ordinance, or the application of same to any person or set of circumstances is, for any reason held to be unconstitutional, void or invalid, the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance shall not be affected thereby, it being the intent of the City Council in adopting this Ordinance that no portion hereof, or provisions or regulations contained herein, shall become inoperative or
